




Project Overview & Update

Policy Recommendations – discussed last SAC meeting

Safe Design

Review of Focus Corridor crash data suggests:

- 31 total fatal and serious injury crashes: 9 fatal and 22 serious injury
- Angle and head on crashes make up 58% of the focus corridor fatal and serious injury crashes
- 16% of crashes occur in dark conditions
- Half of all pedestrian crashes and all bike crashes on the corridors occurred at night
- 27% of crashes involved a driver under the influence and 19% of vehicle occupants were not wearing a seatbelt
- 32% of crashes involved speed concerns

Safe Design

A focus on design and implementation for:

- Skewed intersection geometry
- Access management issues
- Speed studies and potential speed limit reductions
- Lighting
- Bike and pedestrian network gaps
- Critical pedestrian infrastructure near River Valley Transit stops

Safe Design

Road Safety Audits as a means of expediting design

- CTDOT Road Safety Audit Program
- 1-3 Years



Education, Resources, Enforcement

Transition the Advisory Committee to a permanent Vision Zero Council

- Monitor progress
- Address ongoing initiatives

Data Monitoring

- Regularly review update detailed crash analysis to identify hotspots, trends, and high fatal and serious injury crash areas
- Data collection before and after each safety intervention and/or targeted enforcement
- Annual reporting




Concept Plans


